SCIENCE EXPLAINED:

Potatoes are rich in phosphoric acid, which enables a chemical reaction to take place when the copper coin and zinc coin are inserted

This reaction generates a small amount of electricity that's enough to power an LED light!!

One of highlights was Year 6's trip down memory lane when they ventured to Reception. Mrs Sharp remembers like it was yesterday and the children still enjoyed the same activities as they did back in 2017/18.


School Dinner Menu (£2.75) per day or free to Reception, Year 1 & 2 pupils)

Explorers

Another busy week in Explorers!

The children enjoyed their last transition day up to Adventurers this week.

We have done lots of descriptive writing this week! The children have decorated their friendship fish using lots of bright colours. On the back of their fish they have described what makes them a good friend. Following on from making their own habitats last week we have looked at pictures of different underwater habitats and sea creatures and described what we could see.

The Explorers have all enjoyed practicing for sports day during PE this week and are excited for their first sports day next week! We had some cool and calm time in the classroom during our yoga session yesterday, the children followed the story of a little seahorse.

<u>Adventurers</u>

Explorers joined us for a final transition this week, and now that is it until September when we all start in our new classes!

We have been continuing to practise our handwriting of high frequency words in English. We are also using a text this week called 'How to find gold' to practise our skills. For example, we wrote a character description for the crocodile. In the story they use a treasure map, so we have created our own treasure maps in class and the 'treasure' is a letter to the crocodile! Check out some of our maps below.

In Maths we are sticking with fractions. We explored $\frac{1}{4}$ of an amount this week, by sharing amounts between four. We used cubes and counters as our concrete resources, then we moved on to doing it pictorially with part whole models and bar models.

Please can you make sure that your child has brought back their school reading books; over the summer they need to read books from home.

Discoverers



Pioneers

In Pioneers this week we have been focusing again on our science projects: two projects this week.

Katie and Evie introduced us to the power of the potato; if you look very closely in the bottom section of this photo you will see a small LED bulb lit up by the power of potatoes.



After a shaky start we realised that we needed to cut our potatoes in half to double the power and use insulated wire with crocodile clips to improve the chances of conductivity. Using a small LED bulb also helped.


Katy and Evie had completed their research well as to why potatoes (and other vegetables and fruit) can produce electrical charge.




You wouldn't think it possible, but the acid inside the potato forms a chemical reaction with the zinc and copper. When the electrons flow from one

material to another, energy is released. Did the potato work well as a battery? Did you know a single potato can power enough LED lamps for a room for 40 days? The potato acts as an electrolyte which means it enables the electrons to flow through it. When the nail and pennies are connected to a potato in a circuit, the chemical energy is converted to electrical energy which gives enough power to turn on a small light.

All the children in the class eventually managed to light up their bulbs and then researched what other vegetables and fruits could be used to create electricity.



We learnt that woodlice are in fact crustaceans crabs. One group even saw a female woodlouse Many butterflies were seen but just not caught.



Also this week we were supervised by Josiah and Liam in a bug survey in Wake's Woodland. The objective was to try and count how many different species of bugs we could spot.

We choose a sunny day for maximum impact. All bugs were treated with respect and returned to their habitats safely.



We found at least 23 different types of bugs. and in the same family as give birth.






Textile Bank
